
People across the UK got a spectacular and surprise view of the Northern Lights on Friday 10th May, as the most extreme geomagnetic storm in two decades made the natural light show visible much further south than usual.

I had invested in a camera, due to my shoulder injury (no sailing for me this season). The freak phenomena was a golden opportunity to take some pictures. The instruction was to find somewhere facing north around midnight with little light pollution; what better location than The reservoir?

When I arrived at about 11:30, there was a dog walker already perched on the gate exiting the car park with their phone poised. I think they were surprised to be disturbed. No other photographers arrived during my stay (I left at 01:00 hrs as the display was definitely waning by then). In fact, the instruction to look north had been a red herring. The strongest phenomena was definitely in the south.

I took about 80 pictures in total, playing around with camera settings. Most of the photos were poor when examined at home on the computer. I definitely have a lot to learn about photography! There were about six worth saving.

This may not be the only chance to catch the show. That's because the Sun is expected to reach the most active period in its 11-year solar cycle in 2024, making solar storms - and therefore the chance to see the Northern Lights - more likely.

Sailing programme 2025

A look forward to the 2025 Sailing Season


The 2024 sailing season is behind us, some will say thank goodness, as the weather was seldom very kind.

During the recent Prize Giving evening feedback was sought for the 2024 season and what the attendees would like for the 2025 season.

In general most were happy to continue with the same format of the Wednesday Evening, Sunday Morning and Sunday Afternoon race series, although there was agreement to amend the timings on the Sunday race days:

The 11:00 start will be slipped to 11:30 and the 14:00 start will be brought forward to 13:30.

There was considerable discussion on how to improve on the Saturday casual sailing programme. Members voiced opinions that they feared racing would be too competitive and that non racers needed time to build their sailing abilities and confidence before entering a race. Options such as the introduction of a beginners race or a personal handicap race were not well received, but it is intended to introduce a self-timed TSSC Rose Challenge where sailors self record their time to sail a set course using all the marks on the reservoir. This allows sailors to highlight their own improvement without interference on the water....A "Top Gear" type ladder will be created to show comparison with other sailors.



There will be three Ladders;
Single handed and double handed dinghies will record their handicap time corrected using the PY yardstick whilst SUP's Kayakers and Canoeists will record their actual times. See next page for more>>>.

Martha and Tim are happy to continue with their monthly coaching sessions on a Saturday and Syd is happy to continue offering safety boat cover when he is on the water with safety boat familiarisation and instruction. As the number of members using the water on a Saturday increases it may soon be necessary to bring back Safety Boat cover on a Saturday.

It is intended to repeat the successful

-13th April 2025. There are now a
number of 2000 craft at TSSC and of
course access to the CGSC can be negotiated.

Those who watched the Open Meeting in June 2024 will testify that there was a wide range of abilities racing, not all flying their spinnakers. So if you fancy racing in a single class double hander event this will be a great place to begin.

The start of season Kick Start sessions have been reduced to one on Sunday 6th April 2025.

I am willing to cover all topics including Race Officer, Race Day Organisation, Racing Rules of Sailing, Sail Trim down to boat setup.

Please let me know what you would like me to cover, remember, we all had to start somewhere! RYA Level 2 includes rights of way, so with very little additional instruction you can enter your first race and improve your sailing.

It was also highlighted at the Prize Giving discussion that some think the water is closed to non-racers during racing. This is only true during Open Meetings. We simply ask that you keep clear of the start line. The race course will be on display at the club house and the Race Officer can explain the best areas to free sail to avoid conflict.

Overall please remember TSSC is a very friendly sailing club and we are all willing to share our experiences and expertise. Feel free to ask for help at any time.

I look forward to seeing you on the water in 2025 and may you always have the weather you need.

TSSC Rose Challenge - New for 2025

The TSSC Rose Challenge can be sailed at any time during the season. It will involve self recording the time to sail around a set course.

At the end of the season an individual's fastest recorded time will count towards the Prize.

An individual can complete the course as many times as they wish, with their fastest time to count.

Start and Finish will be between bouy1 and the shore nearest the clubhouse.


The Start and Finish Line must be crossed from West to East.

All marks will be left to port.

Course – Start Line, 8, 1, 8, 2, 8, 3, 8, 4, 8, 5, 8, 6, 8, 7, 8, Finish Line.

Leagues for Dinghies, and SUPs, and Kayaks. Dinghy times to be corrected for PY, hence an individual could sail different boats over the year. A helm and dinghy is a single entry, so a helm and multiple dinghies counts as multiple entries. For a helm in a double handed dinghy the helm can have different crews.

Times to be logged with the Sail Planning Group. It is intended to have a ladder in the club house and on the web site.



The recent arctic weather was a reminder to pack up our dinghies for the winter. Here are 10 top tips to winterise your boat.

- 1. Clean your boat Use a mild soap (be conscious if you're washing your boat anywhere sensitive and look to find an eco-friendly one), a sponge and elbow grease are all you need. If you've got the benefit of a hose, blast the blocks and cleats to get any sand or grit build-up out of there.
- 2. Clean your trolley and make sure those trolley touch points are grit-free to save any damage to the hull.
- 3. Gently clean your sails to remove mud, sand or salt. Use a mild soap and warm water and avoid using anything abrasive! If possible, take them inside to dry or pop them in the loft rafters. There's nothing more infuriating than unpacking your sails to find mildew, or spinnaker to find out it



4. Put the top cover on and make sure it's a snug fit and raised if possible to stop the rain pooling. If you've got the space, raise the bow of your boat with a tyre or stand to ensure any water drains out the transom.



- 5. Make sure your boat is dry internally; leave the bung out and bailers open to allow the hull to breathe that fresh winter air.
- 6. Remove any tape you may have added to your hardware. Moisture and varying temperatures can make everything go mouldy under the tape needing a lot of cleaning in the spring.
- 7. Check your rigging and make sure nothing is going to fail over the winter, even better, drop your mast if you can.
- 8. You will preserve your trolley tyres by removing them now, and it makes the boat less likely to be blown over in a storm, but it limits the ability to raise the bow.
- 9. Leash your boat to the floor. You can add anchor points by using sturdy tent pegs. A nice wide strap or chunkier rope across the widest point, with the slack taken up will save your boat from being flipped over by a storm.
- 10. Write a list Write down those niggles from your summer sailing that need to be sorted whilst they're still fresh in your head.

Finally, are you able to pop down to the club every month or so just to drain the water out and check your boat over? (This advice is adapted from RS Sailing).

New Safety Boat to Join the

Fleet at TSSC

Thornton Steward Sailing Club is excited to announce the arrival of a new safety boat, which will replace the Blue Boat after it's engine was sadly stolen earlier this year.


The new addition, a Rigiflex 360 with a 10HP Honda engine, matches the reliable TSSC 2 and is expected to bolster the club's safety operations.

The boat will need a running-in period but is on track to be ready for the start of the new sailing season. It will serve along side TSSC 1 and 2 as a safety boat and instructor boat to provide assistance on larger courses and offer valuable resilience for TSSC 1 and TSSC 2, which, despite their age, continue to perform well. TSSC 2 will remain the default safety boat.

This acquisition is the result of hard work by Syd, Bob, and Graham, who tested various options and secured the best deal. Their efforts ensure the club has a dependable and cost-effective addition to its fleet.

Our new craft is expected to arrive before the end of the year, and we look forward to seeing it in action on the water soon!
