elcome to another season at TSSC, by the time you receive this edition of SailTime, I hope the weather will be looking more Spring-like and thoughts of getting back on the water will be foremost in your minds!.....If not.... then take the opportunity for an armchair catch up by reading on!

When you visit the club next, you'll see some changes.....We have new signage, reflecting our status as a watersports centre, not just a sailing club, positioned on our clubhouse frontage. There are new welcome signs on our compound gate and signs directing members to our new Bio-Wash area, together with security reminders that the Robinson building is alarmed!

Over the winter the club has undergone some well deserved TLC. The clubhouse exterior, interior lounge, galley and changing rooms have all been decorated by a team of hard working volunteers, co-coordinated by Graham Whittall, cracking the paint brushes to complete the task in often cold and damp conditions.....Sterling work all.

The clubhouse lounge, now sports a new blue floor and we hope the new colour scheme will present a light and airy feel for members. Please note... another sign at the main door entrance reminds members that removing or cleaning muddy boots before entering the lounge will help preserve the lounge in a comfortable environment for all users!

A new Bio-Wash area has been created to the rear of the changing room annexe, where you will find a fixed hose for washing down craft that have been off site on other waters and is a requirement before using boats and boards on the TSSC reservoir again.

The 2025 sailing programme has been finalised and can be viewed on the club website, where a range of events are listed, including our Wednesday and Sunday Racing series, RYA courses and other upcoming events. We're pleased to announce that we will again be hosting the 2000 Association open meeting on Sat 12th & Sun 13th April, following a very

successful meeting last year. Hopefully, we will have more boats taking part in the event this year....If you fancy playing out with the big boys, you can enter here!

This year we are hoping to offer additional safety boat services on selected Saturdays as well as Sundays and will require greater involvement for all members, stepping up and taking on their SB duties....Don't forget this is a condition of membership that all adult members and a



lead family member covers a minimum of 2 duties per season.

We are therefore introducing "DutyMan", through our sailing club management system, to allow members to select their own duty dates, swap duties and view the SB rota..... All automatically on-line. Our chief instructor James Proctor will be administering the system and you will have already received your personal log in credentials. For further details, see our DutyMan feature in this edition.

Safety Boat Familiarisation days for any club member are again being offered by our Bosun Syd Nye on Saturdays. You must have completed a SB-Fam day prior to booking a crew slot on our rota. The familiarisation day is free of charge and covers all SB setup, boat handling and basic rescue techniques. Each course is restricted to 2 members only, ensuring a real hands-on day. Whizzing around the water in a power boat is a bonus!

"DutyMan" Safety Boat System



utyMan...What is it?

This year we will be trialling our new Safety Boat software system DutyMan, designed to streamline the process of booking safety boat duties throughout the season.

Some of you will be familiar with using this at other clubs, for some there is a bit of learning involved.

What am I expected to do?

As a condition of membership all adult members and an adult member from each family group are required to cover a minimum of 2 Safety Boat duties per season on a volunteer basis. Dutyman enables members to volunteer for duty slots which fit around their day-to-day commitments.

We hope to provide coverage on selected Saturdays as well as on Sundays during the main sailing season from March to November. However, we will be excluding Safety boat provision for the Wednesday evening Sunset Racing series from the schedule, as we hope it can be handled by the core of members that regularly take part in racing on a rota between themselves, but this still means that we have approx 8 months of weekend safety boat slots to fill and more than 180 SB sessions, so it's really important that members step up to take their turn.

So, how do I get started?


You should have received an email from James (TSSC Club Admin) on 13th Feb w hich contains this link to jump you to TSSC's Dutyman: https://tssc-training.co.uk/events w hich looks like this: Alternatively, on the TSSC w ebsite https://www.thornton-stew.ard-sailingclub.co.uk/ on the Members tab, select Safety Boat DutyMan.



Either way, you now need to log in with the details you were sent at about the same time.

What does SB Duty involve?

Safety Boat services are scheduled from 11:00am to 4:00pm, how ever these are "on the Water" times and you should allow 30 minutes prior and after the duty for preparing, launching, recovering and packing away boat and equipment.

If you are a designated Helm, you will likely have a less experienced Crew member attending with you, this is a good opportunity to pass on your experience as a training exercise.

All Helm and Crew members are required to attend a "SB Familiarisation day" before booking safety boat duties. Our Bosun - Syd Nye will take you through all aspects of preparing the safety boat, explaining the equipment and train you on basic recovery and rescue techniques.

The SB-Fam days are free to attend and are limited to 2 members per day, providing hands-on experience both on and off the water.

Important notes:

If you have a duty that you cannot swap or give away it is still your responsibility to cover that duty to ensure that we always have SB coverage.

If you arrange a sw ap or give aw ay a duty by another means...WhatsApp, phone, bribery, flattery...you are responsible for updating DutyMan!



If insufficient duties are volunteered for, we will begin to assign dates and duties to members....So please ensure you choose a minimum of 2 duties as soon as possible to avoid being allocated a less convenient date!

irst Aid Course 22nd Feb

The aim of the day was to get folk their RYA 1st Aid certification. This is a requirement for all holders of RYA practical Instructional qualifications, they must have the 1st Aid certificate before taking up the role and in the case of 1st Aid must re qualify every 3 years to keep them in date.

It is obviously of benefit to have as many other people 1st Aid qualified. There were 10 students, 4 from CGSC, 2 from TSSC, 3 from Teasdale SC and one lady who was so impressed with the Club Facebook advert that she decided to attend to learn more, she does not sail has no intention of learning. The training was run by Ellie Meadows who has carried out training for us before and yet again thoroughly enjoyed teaching the class and marvelled at their enthusiasm.

TSSC Rose Challenge

Introducing something a little different this year. As a test of boat handling and the ability to sail a set course, we hope the Rose Challenge (named after the course shape, will tempt Dinghy Sailors, Paddleboarders and Kayakers to take part in a club wide event.... without entering formal races.

The TSSC Rose Challenge can be sailed at any time during the season. It will involve recording the time to sail around a set course.

At the end of the season an individual's fastest recorded time will count towards the Prize.

An individual can complete the course as many times as they wish, with their fastest time to count.

Start and Finish will be between 1 and the shore nearest the clubhouse.

The Start and Finish Line must be crossed from West to East.

All marks will be left to port.


Course -

Start Line, 8, 1, 8, 2, 8, 3, 8, 4, 8, 5, 8, 6, 8, 7, 8, Finish Line.

There will be leagues for Dinghies, SUPs and Kayaks.

Dinghy times to be corrected for PY, hence an individual could sail different boats over the year.

A helm and dinghy is a single entry, so a helm and multiple dinghies counts as multiple entries. For a helm in a double handed dinghy the helm can have different crews.

A 3 pronged attack to keep the clubhouse clean!

- Outside main entrance, a new Coir Mat with inbuilt metal scrapers
- On the side wall (under the ladies changing room window), a purpose built stand with stiff brushes and scrapers for soles and boots with deeper treads
- A hand held brush connected to water tap ,ideal for removing sheep excrement and mud from sailing boots.

So now there is no excuse!!

IT IS ESSENTIAL THAT MEMBERS DO CHECK THEIR FOOTWEAR BEFORE ENTERING THE CLUBHOUSE.

Over the next few weeks we will begin to get all the club boats ready for the new sailing season. We will be fitting two new self-bailers to the Wanderers and have a load of new wheels for the launching trollies (they are nice and shiny and blue so please do not borrow them³).

We have begun cutting up the old boats in the graveyard to the rear of the club, potentially there will be some more to dispose of once the membership is completed for the coming year. If you could assist by taking some of the cutup bits to the local tip it would help us.

Our newly acquired 2k, is currently undergoing refurbishment.... we have had to buy some new fittings and rigging, but, we hope it should be ready for the coming season.

If you are not used to sailing a 2k and would like to do so there are instructors available to help you on second and fourth Saturdays per month. The 2k is a double-hander so don't use this craft, or the Wanderers, unless you feel competent and confident to do so, as they are fibre glass and take longer to repair than the Fusions!

We have a new safety boat TSSC3 (or Donald as it is now known! - Orange etc!) and a new outboard engine, replacing the equipment that was stolen last year. Currently we are in the process of running the new engine, but as does not have a prop guard fitted, you are therefore requested not to use it....As a common fault of boat handling among less experienced helms, is forgetting to unlock, turn off and tilt the engine prior to landing thus damaging the propeller or gear box.

Our other outboards have recently been serviced and are working well; the default safety boat remains as TSSC2 so please use that. Thanks all Syd, Bosun

Racing for everyone

In a previous life at a previous sailing club I took part in some club racing. I messed up my manoeuvre at a buoy and got in the way of one of the club's best sailors who vented his frustration in no uncertain terms. Although he was friendly again when we were off the water I was scarred by the experience, my confidence was shaken, and I didn't race at the club again. Fast forward a few years; I moved to Richmond and joined TSSC.....but I still wasn't going to race..... Fast forward again and I am eagerly awaiting the start of club racing – so what's changed?....Everything! Spending time at TSSC, I realised I was surrounded by friendly and supportive sailors who encourage each other, often with a sense of fun and humour. Still reluctant to race, I did want to improve my sailing skills so I took part in some of Trevor Bradley's training sessions. These were invaluable in many ways, but most significantly in his encouragement to race and debunking of my fears that I couldn't race because I didn't know all the rules (I still don't!), or that I would be in the way on the start line or at a buoy. Listening to the racers' chat and banter I started to thinkmaybe. Trevor's gentle encouragement continued and one Sunday I rigged my boat and stood at the blackboard trying to memorise the racecourse!

So, what's good about racing at TSSC? Everything! The start line is much longer than needed so there's lots of room and it's easy to keep out of the way of others. There's usually someone who isn't wearing a race watch so as well as the flags & hooters there's shouting between sailors of the countdown to the start. Given the size of the reservoir the course is fairly short so although I know I'll be overtaken within a couple of laps I don't lose contact with the other boats. The encouragement continues on the water, Trevor often shouts coaching tips as he whizzes past me. Once back on land people are happy to answer questions such as why they tacked when they did.

Perhaps the best thing is the feeling of improving, whether it's getting a better start, handling a manoeuvre or reading a wind shift (although I'm still really poor at this). For most of us racing is really about racing against oneself, it definitely improves one's skills and the sense of achievement by sailing better is priceless. I might still be at the back of the fleet but I'm sailing better, and I'm having fun.

As well as Wednesday evening and Sunday racing this year we have the 'Rose Challenge' (details on page 8 here), the perfect way of racing against yourself and of racing without a start line, what's not to like?

So, as the new season approaches do give racing a go. Catch the **Kick Start** session on Sunday 6th April.

If you are bringing or returning equipment to TSSC that wasn't washed down at the last body of water it was used on, you must wash it down on arrival at the club.
